Deluge of Parts at BTM by Pete Stroble

It has happened again, in one month's time, we have been blessed by four different donors who have brought British car parts to our door. Not wanting to see them go homeless, we've brought them in. Our hope is to be able to use them to maintain the BTM collection or to find new homes for them with other enthusiasts. Preservation is half of our mission and getting ever rarer parts into the hands of restorers certainly helps us

accomplish that.



There were several jewels in the donated parts but the biggest would be the Lo-Cost kit donated by Harold Davis of Indiana. The Lo-Cost was a homebuilt take off on the Lotus 7. This project has the frame, nose, "clam shell" fenders, steering rack, A arms, 2 transmissions, diff for an independent rear end setup, coil over shocks, plus much more. You can go with the engine of your choice. We were wondering if BTM put a BMC A series motor in it, like some of the early Lotus 7's, if we could legitimately display it as a British vehicle. A Lo-Cost was always on my personal wish list but I'm aging out of any major undertakings. In the end, we will probably sell this project to help fund other restorations. Anyone interested in a very neat project?



Another jewel from the Ted Bernstein Estate is a Mini Cooper S gearbox with straight cut gears and a 3.9 Limited Slip Diff. The gear set is new and the build is super clean with many bits safety wired for reliability. It has the matching idler gear housing and clutch cover. It came from an estate of a former Mini racer so this was probably a back-up spare. Also in the tubs is a set of 7.5" disc brakes and a rebuilt brake booster. To go with the racer theme, he had two sets of unused Mini flares, one 2" set and one 5" set. Four very nice 10X 4.5 Cooper S steel wheels were in the pile as well as S pistons (Jahns flat top) and two sets of rods.

Of real interest to the Museum are the 17 different sizes of inner tubes, from 15" to 33". These will come in handy with the variety of leaky tires we contend with. Ten shop manuals for a variety of marques will end up in our Library.



Tim Shaw of Michigan donated a pallet full of MG Midget parts, some new and some used. Tim's Midget won "Best of Show" at this year's Texas MG Meet. We inherit the parts that were not up to the high bar that Tim has set for his Midget. Lucky us! On the pallet were 6 different Lucas lens assemblies, a perfect rear bumper, new ignition coil and water pump, new wheel trim rings,

plus many more.



Jim Miller is moving out of state so this is a good time to weed out parts that he no longer needs. A brand new MGB driver's side floor pan and door sill are parts that might end up being in one of our MGB projects. Four very nice Rostyle wheels will save us from having to restore a set that we have. A Lucas 45DE4 distributor, CIBIE lights, chrome air cleaners, chrome trim pieces round out the package. Thanks Jim!

Support from the British car community is what keeps BTM afloat. It is with a deep appreciation of all the physical effort that goes into getting these valuable parts to us that we extend a "Thank You" to current and past donors.
